Starter Questions-

What other names are there for a stone curlew?

Where do stone curlews migrate to in the winter?

Which parts of the UK does the stone curlew prefer?

FACT- Only about 400 pairs of Stone Curlews are thought to nest in the UK each year. Their population is stable, thanks to farmers creating bare ground (for nest sites), being aware of nest sites and avoiding running machinery over nests, and also thanks to the work of game and conservation managers to control predators which threaten stone curlews and other ground nesting birds.
